

Uninsured in Georgia?

You may qualify for a new health coverage program.

What is the Georgia Pathways to Coverage program?

Georgia Pathways to Coverage ("Pathways" for short) is a new Medicaid program for uninsured adults who are working or going to school at least part time and have low incomes.

Who qualifies for coverage?

You must meet all of the following requirements to qualify for the Pathways program.

- ☐ Your income must be within these ranges (see chart below)
- ☐ American citizen or documented, qualified permanent resident
- ☐ Be between the ages of 19 and 64
- ☐ Be able to document that you are working or attest that you are doing another qualifying activity for at least 80 hours per month.

What health care services are covered by Georgia Pathways to Coverage?

* All ranges are based on 2023 FPL guidelines.

- Your annual check-up with your doctor and other primary care
- Prescription medicines
- Mental health services
- · Inpatient hospital care

How to apply

Apply online

- Visit <u>www.gateway.ga.gov</u>. Select Apply for Benefits to begin.
- Select Medical Assistance as a program.
- Follow the online prompts to apply for Medicaid.

Apply by phone

- You can apply by phone by calling 877-423-4746
- After your call, you may need to provide additional information or documentation.

Apply in person

- Schedule an appointment at your local DFCS.
- Bring documents to support your work hours (ex: pay stubs, proof of income, or school schedule).

How to keep your coverage

By the 3rd of each month, re-confirm that you are still working or doing other "qualifying activities"! The final deadline for reporting is the 17th of each month. Qualifying activities may include:

- Employment (including self-employment)
- On-the-job training
- Job readiness assistance
- Volunteering for a nonprofit organization
- Vocational educational training or participation with the Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency
- Enrollment in college or technical school

If you do not report your hours by the 17th, your coverage will stop at the end of that month. The easiest way to report your work and other activities is online at www.gateway.ga.gov through "Report My Changes."

- Outpatient services at hospitals
- Health services from specialists, if medically necessary
- Preventive care to keep you healthy

Georgia deserves more than **Pathways!** You deserve

The Pathways program is a broken bridge that lets too many Georgians and too much money fall

through the cracks.

The Pathways program is complicated, leaves too many Georgians uninsured, and leaves hard-earned taxpayer money on the table. Georgians deserve better. Luckily Georgia leaders can replace it with a program that is simpler, covers more people, and costs less per person:

Medicaid expansion!

Georgians deserve Medicaid expansion! How many Georgians would newly get health insurance through Medicaid?1

Only 31,000-100,000 Georgians

More than 400,000 Georgians

Who is left behind and is likely to stay uninsured, even after the program is up & running?2

- Stay-at-home parents
- · Caregivers for aging family members or children with a disability
- People in mental health or addiction recovery programs
- · Rural residents and communities of color where good jobs are much harder to find or may not exist at all
- People who do not have good internet at home or do not own a car

Almost no one!

That's 5 times less than Pathways.

What does the program cost?3 \$2,490 per person

Georgia has to pay for 30% of costs.

Georgia does not receive any extra money for Pathways.

\$496 per person

Georgia only has to pay for 10% of costs.

Georgia would earn a "sign-on bonus" by choosing Medicaid expansion. The bonus would cover the costs of Medicaid expansion for 2 years with some money left over to meet the needs of families in our state.
